CHRISTMAS EVENT TURNS TO BLIZZARD IN THE COUNTY

EASTON, Maine – A blizzard hit the Easton area Dec. 14 at 2:30 p.m. and blocked the departure of almost 50 guests from an open house at Center Farms Inc. until a plow bailed them out later that evening.

Employees of Center Farms started clearing the yard at 6 p.m., but the icy road conditions and 8-foot snowdrifts were still too dangerous for anyone to leave. The Maine Department of Transportation waited until the storm passed before dispatching several plows and salt trucks to Easton.
